





Hi, my name is Kate Davenport. I am the year 6 teacher at OLOTA, and amongst lots of other roles, I am responsible for leading maths across the school.

I think maths can be a bit like marmite – you either love it or hate it! I have been teaching for nearly 20 years and the primary maths curriculum has changed a lot in that time: it has become more challenging in terms of the content that the children have to learn, how quickly they have to learn it and the variety of ways in which they are expected to apply it. I think unfortunately that this sometimes causes the children to become disengaged with maths because they think they can't do it.

We are all working really hard here at OLOTA to try and turn this around: more resources have been bought for the classrooms so that the children can gain a concrete and practical understanding of their maths; a new maths scheme is being followed which allows the children to explore elements of maths in more detail before rushing them on to new learning; pre teaching groups have been set up to give some children extra support in accessing the lessons; working walls are being designed to provide focused examples that the children can use to help them with their work. I feel very proud of all the positive changes that have been happening in maths and know that we will be able to 'hit the ground running' once the school opens again.

My aim is to try and help all of our children feel really positive about maths!

In the meantime, I thought I would send out this maths newsletter from time to time, with any useful information or resources that may be of benefit during school closure and even when we reopen.
